INTEX IN 6633

Post the QWERTY profusion, it seems domestic mobile handset players going gung-ho on Wi-Fi and push mail features on their 'cost-effective' handsets.

Micromax started the trend by adding Wi-Fi to the Q7 (*see above*) and MVL added the push mail support to the G81. And now, Intex has incorporated both in its latest dual SIM phone: the IN6633. It borrows its looks from the Nokia E63; the phone is made of red and black plastic. The placement of the keys is also similar. The home screen reminded me of the BlackBerry phones. A few icons including message, Java applications, web browser and camera are placed at the bottom. Unfortunately, even after picking up the GPRS settings, the phone failed to connect to the Internet.

However, when connected to a Wi-Fi network, we had to switch over to WLAN in the Internet settings. Nimbuzz and Facebook are hidden under the Intex Zone. Other utility features include a call answering machine which automatically responds to a call after a defined time and records a message. The phone comes with an inbuilt wireless FM radio. Changing music tracks is a question of shaking the device. The 2 MP camera offers crisp results. On the downside, the call reception isn't the best around.
